The 2022 Auction was the most successful fundraiser FOHJI has ever had. The online auction grossed a record \$59,099! The last in-person auction was held in the Morgan Center in 2020, and it amassed over \$20,000, which was considered a significant profit. Given the enormous success of last year's and this year's auctions, future auctions will be held online.

On February 18, **Helen Ladson** gave an engaging presentation titled "St. Andrews Beach Community: The Success that Trauma Birthed"; she presented an overview of the African-American experience on Jekyll Island, including the trauma that led to the creation of the St. Andrews Beach Community and its success in the 1950s.

FOHJI hosted award-winning author June Hall McCash on April 28. She discussed her most recent book *The Truth Keepers*, which is the second book in her trilogy about the DuBignon Family and Jekyll

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Financial Report By Ted Fleshman, Treasurer

FOHJI has a total of \$198,185 in checking and money market accounts. A total of \$46,668 is committed for projects, such as Tiffany Window Conservation (\$30,230), Chimney Caps (\$9,000), Pump House Rehabilitation (\$5,000) and Internships (\$10,000), leaving a balance of \$151,517 available for new projects. The \$7,561 in Faith Chapel's account is committed to the Tiffany Window Conservation project.

A couple of years ago FOHJI funded the fumigation of the Baker-Crane Carriage House, but no other work has been done on the structure.
